

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Peace in the bathroom

It's the pendulum law: you go from end to end to find a centre again. First, centuries of Puritanism and then decades of shortage in the post-war period had relegated the bath to a service, the hiding-place for the body and its weaknesses. Before the arrival of Philippe Starck and its liberation, the bathroom was a prisoner of thousand taboos and restricted spaces: nobody talked about it and nobody dared show it off. The end of the twentieth century, with its social, anthropological, genetic changes has brought the human body back to the centre of the universe. If life is temporary, if the world is increasingly dirt and polluted, maybe we ought to build a new bath, where we can rediscover an old wellbeing and take care of the only property we cannot do without: our body!

But can we afford bathrooms like something out of the Arabian Nights, a cocooning solipsist's bathroom? Will there be enough water to support the spa industry, by now more numerous than ponds?

If, as Cassandra and the Sages maintain, in a very near future, speaking of a successful product we'll say "it's quite sustainable", the same way as we now say "it's beautiful" or "high-class", perhaps the "shifting down" season has started for the bathroom, too. That is, to reduce, slow down, take away, to enjoy more with less, without side damages. So, maybe after twenty years in the limelight, now the bath wants some peace. Neither lavatory nor showcase. Maybe with a bit of irony, as suggested by designers of all ages and cultures.

Among others, the fifty-year old Franco Perrotti and his friend comic-strip writer Tanino Liberatore. Their mirror-lamp called L'Homme au turban rouge et son cousin comes from a beneficial obsession for the Flemish painter Van Eyck in general and his Man with a red turban in particular. And like the very young Greek designers of Greece is for lovers, who take some myths and stereotypes of their land and change them into smiling tools.
